women were provided a unit in our 3 supportive and transitional housing programs at 3 locations – Addictions Supportive Housing (ASH), Elm Ave Housing Site & Palmerston House (PH)

I was introduced to Jean Tweed through Tracy when she came into the Vanier Center for Women, helping me with the release from custody program. She then offered to put me on a waitlist for the Jean Tweed Centre. When I was released from jail Tracy came herself to pick me up and bring me to the Ellen house for women in Brampton. While I was there I started my intake process for Jean Tweed. I ended up leaving the Ellen house and thanks to Tracy I was given a second chance. I then left again and returned to my ex boyfriend who talked me into returning to a life of crime. He was extremely abusive and a very scary person. I was involved in a situation I feared I would never be able to escape from. On more than one occasion the abuse was so bad, he almost killed me. I had to do the Jean Tweed entry classes before doing the residential program and during one of those days I spent hours on the phone with the counsellors trying to find a shelter that would be safe for me, where he couldn't find me. There were no beds available and I had to return to him. Exactly one week later is when I called my dad to rescue me from Nova Scotia, my ex-boyfriend took me there to do more crime. I stayed with my sister until I could get into the residential program with Jean Tweed.

A few days before I was to enter the Centre I received a call that I had new charges being filed against me and that I had to turn myself in or there would be a warrant issued for my arrest. I contacted a lawyer and he got them to allow me to go to the residential program and I was to turn myself in after I completed the program. Covid hit During my time at Jean Tweed, and we were sent home early – I was unable to turn myself in. Jean Tweed started their online aftercare and trauma programs, I completed all of them. I felt extremely fortunate I made the right choice and went to treatment instead of running away. My life would be very different today, had I not stayed.

Jean Tweed is a part of my life now, I never thought I would be able to live a normal life having gone through the things I did. My life went from getting hooked to opiates after a car accident to selling my body, to being human trafficked, then to being molded into committing bank frauds and having a criminal record at the age of 41.

I was at my lowest point ever and I tried to take my own life, thankfully I am still here today. I was scared of my ex and the life that I ran from and I was full of shame and guilt for everything my addiction brought me to do. Becoming a slave to a substance is the hardest thing I've ever had to overcome. The years I lost I can never get back.

Now my life is full of hope as a result of all the hard work and dedication that I put into my recovery. I have a life that I never could have imagined for myself. I have my own apartment and I am in a healthy relationship with someone who treats me very well and loves me knowing everything that happened. He loves my honesty, which is another step forward – I was never honest with anyone in my past, not even myself. My son is in my life again, and that's been my greatest gift, it took me 7 years of patience and hard work to finally have full access to him. I missed his grade 8 graduation as I was serving my sentence but I made it to his high school graduation. I was able to be at my son's schools robotics competition live when they achieved the highest score in the world and I was also able to watch them win provincials. I believe had I not chosen to go to Jean Tweed my life would have been spent in the penitentiary.

When I did finally turn myself in, Jean Tweed provided me an amazing letter, which I believe saved my life. I was only sentenced to a year of house arrest with a conditional sentence and no probation afterwards.

I now give back to the community as a volunteer at Womankind in Hamilton chairing AA meetings. I also sit on the Board of the Autumn leaf Roundup Committee in Hamilton and have for the past 2 years now.

I feel extremely fortunate to have had this experience with Jean Tweed. Your staff and services have helped me become a proper member of society. I feel blessed to be able to continue to be a part of such an amazing group. I send women to Jean Tweed as much as I possibly can as you have changed my life and if I am able to help just one woman stay alive one more day than that to me is a gift.

Thank you for helping me love myself again. I know you get what you put into recovery. Without Tracy coming into Vanier that day and for allowing me back into the Ellen house after I messed up I wouldn't be alive and living such an amazing life today. I am so truly grateful for all of the counsellors and staff that keep things going for all the women out there. Most of all a big thank you to Tracy for being such a big part of my journey from the beginning.

Thank you for allowing me to share my story with you and most of all thank you for saving my life.


